
## MILLION DOLLAR WALL WALL WALL


A "Million Dollar Word" is one that is not used on a daily basis. These words are a more intelligent way of expressing our thoughts.

## Starter Million Dollar Words

- 3. **Cantankerous:** adjective- easily angered and difficult to get along with The old man was very cantankerous when he was awakened from his nap by his noisy grandchildren.
- Colossal: adjective- unusually large
   It is a challenge to climb a colossal sized mountain.
- 5. **Flabbergasted:** verb- to amaze or astonish somebody completely He was flabbergasted by the news of his promotion.
- Flaunt: verb- to show something off
   The eagle was flaunting his feathers.
- 7. Flourish: verb- to sustain continuous steady strong growth
  It is wonderful to see a person flourish in their new skills.
- 8. **Gargantuan:** adjective- tremendously large in amount, number, or size My mom always tells me that I have a gargantuan sized mess in my room.
- Meander: verb- to wander slowly and aimlessly
   It is very annoying when a car is meandering down the road when I have somewhere I need to go.
- 10. **Mendacity:** noun- a lie on purpose

  Most of the time, tabloids are full of mendacity.
- 11. Rambunctious: adjective- noisy, very active, and hard to control I would describe my students as very rambunctious at times.
- 12. **Oblivious:** adjective- unaware of or paying no attention to somebody or something

Teachers become very annoyed when their class is oblivious of lesson being taught.

- 13. Robust: adjective- strong and healthy When the baby was born, he was very robust.
- 14. **Vivacious:** adjective- showing liveliness and high spiritedness

  The team was very vivacious when they won their game.
